L. You up the power supply to its maximum voltage. You read -7.5 C . What is the capacitance of the capacitor?
M. What is the maximum voltage of your power supply?
3. On another day you find a different parallel plate capacitor, but you don't have your voltage/ charge meter. Instead you have a micrometer (reads very small distances) and a ruler.
A. You measure one side of one of the square plates at 25 cm . What is the area of the plate?
B. The micrometer reads $12 \mu \mathrm{~m}$ between the plates. What will you use for d ?
C. Now that you have measured the physical dimensions of the capacitor, what is its capacitance?
D. If the distance between the plates of the capacitor was half as much, what is its new capacitance?
E. By halving the plate distance you $\qquad$ the capacitance.
